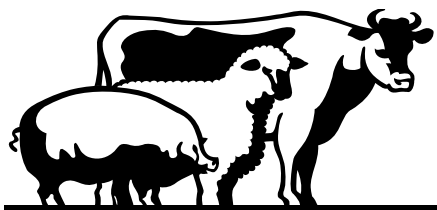

- Entry forms for Primary Animal Exhibitors are also due at the above days and times.
- Animal entry forms will not be accepted in the Extension office unless prior arrangements are made with the 4-H agent only.
- Use the **2011 Cowlitz County Fair 4-H Youth Entry Forms** available at the WSU Extension office or the FFA/Natural Resources Building on entry days.
- Please **DO NOT** send the animal entry forms for 4-H to the superintendents or to the Expo Center/Fair office.
- Separate forms are required for each species of animal because there are different animal divisions and each has a different superintendent.



Activity Information for Animal Exhibitors

Animal Educational Exhibits & Posters for Cowlitz County Fair Only

- Animal educational exhibits/posters for those wanting their exhibits/posters displayed in the respective barns are due the same time and place as the animal entry forms.
- Animal educational posters not turned in by the July 1 deadline may be turned in at the 4-H Department at the same time Still Life exhibits are accepted on Saturday, July 23 and Sunday, July 24, 1:00 to 5:00 p.m. However, they will be displayed in the 4-H Still Life Department during fair.

Animal Educational Exhibits/Posters Pick up Date

- Judged educational exhibits/posters may be picked up from the Natural Resources Building on **Friday, July 1st from 6:00 pm to 7:00 p.m.**
- Posters must be picked up by club, not by individual members and will be signed out by club. They can be picked up by the main club leader, assistant leader, designated 4-H member or designated parent.

Posters/Educational Exhibits going to Community Fairs

- It is the responsibility of the 4-H Club leader or designee to pick up judged educational exhibits by club on Friday, **July 1st between 6 pm to 7 pm** at the FFA/Natural Resources Building.
- It is the responsibility of the 4-H member or leader to enter the posters at the community fairs and also to take them to the Cowlitz County fair for display in the respective animal barns.

Record books going to Community Fairs

- Will be managed by the Record Book Superintendent.

Demonstrations

4-H members wanting to do **live animal demonstrations** must complete **4-H Youth Entry Form** and turn it in by **July 1st Animal Entry Deadline**.

Demonstration days and times for live animals will need to be arranged with the respective animal superintendent(s).

Specific Animal Exhibit & Entry Requirements & Information

Dairy Exhibitors

4-H members must have Dairy certificates for their exhibit animals on file in the Extension office by May 1st.

Dog Exhibitors

All dogs must have proof of current vaccinations including rabies vaccination by a licensed veterinarian. The dogs will be given a health check Wednesday morning. Dogs with disease or parasites will be barred from exhibiting.

Cat Exhibitors

A health inspection will take place when animals arrive at the fair. Each cat must show proof of current vaccination against rabies, feline panleukopenia, and chlamydia. An inoculation form (WS4HF/1.3m) should be completed at the administering veterinarian’s office. This form is available in the Extension office. Specific cat exhibitor information will be sent out after July 1st.

Horse Exhibitors

Your main club leader is responsible for having the correct forms and instructions. Follow specific project instructions from your main horse club leader.

Animal Feed and Equipment

For large animals it is the exhibitor’s responsibility to provide the following: Hay and grain, and equipment such as water buckets, wheelbarrow, pitchforks, broom, grooming equipment, etc.

All exhibitors are required to do Barn **Herdsmanship** and to be responsible for daily care of their animals. Failure to do herdsmanhip can result in loss of ribbons, premiums, and/or participation.

Decorations

Be sure to read the 4-H Cowlitz County Fair General Information section for specific requirements for decorations. Each club is responsible for decorating their area, including educational information. Please be aware that decorations must not cause a fire hazard as outlined in the Cowlitz County 4-H Fair General Information section.

BEEF INFORMATION

1. Wash racks must be kept clean. All items left on the wash rack will be picked up and kept by the superintendents until asked for. Wash rack, clipping and exercise times will be posted in the 4-H Beef Barn.
2. Calves must be at least three months of age at time of showing in order to be shown in a lot by themselves.
3. No beef animals will be permitted outside of their assigned stall areas unless during respective exercise and/or show times or by permission of the 4-H beef superintendent.
4. Method of watering beef animals will be determined by the 4-H beef superintendent to maintain a safe environment for the public during the time that the fair is open.
5. NEW RULE: All stalled animals must be double tied. Animals will be led with a control halter or show halter while on the fairgrounds.

1. If you are unable to show, advise superintendent at least 48 hours prior to check in. Failure to do so may result in loss of right to show next year.

2. All entries must be permanently tattooed in left ear.
3. All entry blanks must be filled out with correct age, sex, breed and variety of rabbit, if purebred. Be sure exhibits are entered in correct lot. Animals entered improperly may receive white awards only.
4. Limit 2 entries per lot, per breed, per exhibitor.
5. All stock must be delivered to the fairgrounds clean and in show condition. All stock will be examined for disease and parasites. Stock showing disease and/or parasites will be barred from entering.
6. Exhibitors are responsible for ice for their own rabbits on hot days.
7. No excessive loitering by exhibitors.
8. No does with litters under four weeks of age, or over 8 weeks of age.
9. No does over 3 weeks pregnant.
10. Awards will be placed on breeds recognized by the Standards of Perfection of the ARBA and with the exception of cross breeds and meat classes which will be judged on meat quality only.
11. Judges decisions will be final.
12. Entries will be accepted in the rabbit barn from 3 pm to 7 pm on the day before fair opens.
13. All entries will stay in place until the last day of Fair at closing time.
14. There will be a mandatory meeting of all exhibitors, leaders and parents before fitting and showing begins.
15. Rabbit educational posters must be entered on a separate entry form and be turned in to the WSU Extension office by July 1st.
16. Exhibitors entering the 4-H/FFA Market Sale must have their pen of animals weighed Wednesday, prior to fair by a Market Sale Committee member and/or the respective superintendent.

HERDSMANSHIP INFORMATION

1. Health requirements set by Washington State 4-H Dog Program and Cowlitz County 4-H Dog Program will be enforced and followed as directed by the 4-H Youth agent and 4-H Dog Superintendent.
2. Dogs must be clean and fully groomed.
3. All dogs must have proof of current vaccinations: rabies, distemper, infectious hepatitis, leptospirosis, parainfluenza, parvo, corona and bordatella. Proof of a current rabies vaccination by a **licensed veterinarian** will be required for vet check.
4. All dogs will be given a health check by an animal health professional on Thursday morning, first day of fair from 9:30 to 10:00 a.m. for disease and parasites. Those dogs with disease and parasites will be barred from showing.
5. Members must be enrolled in the Dog Project and provide care and management by May 1.
6. 4-H exhibitors will be entered in classes for which they and their dog are most qualified. (See Washington 4-H Dog Program Guidelines for clarification.)
7. Only one entry permitted in each lot. 4-H members may share a dog as outlined by Washington State 4-H Dog Program Guidelines and with prior approval of the 4-H Dog Superintendent.
8. If 4-H County Dog Rules are in conflict with State rules (State Fair and Washington State 4-H Dog Program Guidelines) State rules will prevail with the 4-H agent having final authority.
9. Herdsmanship is required. Failure to do so may result in loss of premium points. The purpose of herdsman-ship is to teach exhibitors how to care for their dogs and equipment to the best of their ability at a show or fair. It is also an excellent opportunity for 4-H members to educate the public on dog care and training.

10. Herdsmanship, grooming, handling, and exercise of the dog must be performed by the 4-H exhibitors. Violations of this rule create loss of learning experience to the exhibitor and unfair competition to other members, particularly in the Fitting and Showing Contest. Pride in your pet and yourself will be reflected in a well maintained exhibit and healthy, safe care of your animals.
11. Those not complying with 4-H dog rules and 4-H Code of Conduct may forfeit all premiums, awards, State Fair qualifications, and may be excused from the fair, with the 4-H agent having the final authority.

An inoculation certificate (form WS4HF/1.3m) should be completed at the administering veterinarian’s office. This form is available on the WSU website and/or in the extension office. This form is required for state fair.
3. No pregnant or nursing cats may be shown. Kittens must be at least 12 weeks of age and completely vaccinated.
4. The 4-H member is responsible for the care and training of the project animal 60 days prior to the fair, and must care for the cat while on display at the fair. Food and water are the owner’s responsibility.
5. All cats must be ready for display by 10:00 am and picked up by fair closing time on the last day of fair. All cats and cage decorations must remain on display

until that time, or the 4-H member may forfeit all awards and premiums.

6. Cats must be kept in their show cages, except when being shown. All cats must be in harness at all times. Cats must remain in the exhibit area and may not be out on the fairgrounds.
7. Exhibitors must enter fitting and showing, herdsman-ship, cage decoration, and one type class. Costumes, cat bowl, and cat judging classes are optional.
8. Cages will be provided for exhibitors. Cages are approximately 22”Hx25”Wx23”D. All sides of the cage and top may be decorated but cats must remain in full view.
9. Each cage must have a small poster (8 1/2 “x 11”) introducing the exhibitor and their cat, with a short statement and photo as part of the cage decoration.
