2011 Cowlitz County Fair Rules & Regulations

1. All departments and exhibits must be open to the public 11:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. Thursday, 11:00 a.m. to 11:00 p.m. Friday and Saturday, and 11:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. Sunday.
2. The general supervision of the entire Fair, including all exhibits, entertainment and concessions, has been vested in the officers and manager by the Board of Directors. The management reserves the final and absolute right to alter, interpret or change these rules and regulations as may become necessary.
3. The Fair Board and management reserve the right to reject any entries offered. Exhibitors shall not remove any exhibit from the Fair before Sunday after the Fair without written permission of the management. All awards, including ribbons and money, will be forfeited by exhibitors removing their entries before this time. Check with Department Superintendents for Sunday or Monday checkout times.
4. Exhibitors must check department rules for number of entries allowed in each lot. Entries will be accepted on a space available basis. Any exhibit not claimed within the allotted department date and time as posted in the departments information will become property of the Fair.
5. Unless specifically accepted, exhibitors must in all cases be the bona-fide owner of articles or animals entered by them. Any exhibit found objectionable by the Department Superintendent and/or Fair management may be refused.
6. No awards will be given any entry which judges deem not worthy.
7. Exhibitors will at all times give the necessary personal attention to whatever they may have on exhibit, and at the close of the Fair must take entire charge of their property and remove same property. Each exhibitor will be solely responsible for any damage done to, or occasioned by or arising from any animal exhibit by him, and shall indemnify the Cowlitz County Fair against all legal or other power for the safe preservation of all stock and articles on exhibit, on all property of every character entered for competition or display or for any other purpose, or being anywhere on the Fairgrounds shall be subject to the control of the Fair management. In no case will the management be responsible in any way for any loss, damage, or injury of any character to any property while the same is on the Fairgrounds. If property owners or others interested in the property desire protection against loss, damage, or injury from fire or any other cause, they must make their own arrangements. No officer, trustee, superintendent or employee of the

Cowlitz County Fair has authority to change or modify or suspend this rule.

8. All exhibitors requiring special booth, pens, or other similar facilities must notify the manager or department superintendent by the date specified in the department rules.
9. Competition in all departments except 4-H and FFA will be open to all persons.
10. Any person interfering with the judge during the adjudication of awards will forfeit the right of premiums and all officers or judges are requested to report any violation of this rule to the Fair Manager.
11. All prize awards shall be paid by check issued by the Cowlitz County Auditor's office as soon as all entry records are received and processed by the Fair office and payment can be reasonably made. The amount of money offered for any exhibit is to be clearly stated in the Exhibitor Handbook. Checks must be cashed within 30 days of the date of issue; otherwise funds will be forfeited back to the Fair. The Fair Office must be notified of any errors on the check within 30 days of issue. It is provided that the management of any department, except Open CLASS Livestock, may elect to use the points system in stating their cash awards. Any department wishing to set up this system must first obtain the approval of the general manager of the Fair. The Danish System of judging will be confined to Youth, Domestic Arts, Art, Porcelain, Poultry and China Painting groups only.
12. Under no circumstances will any person or firm be allowed to place an exhibit on the Fairgrounds, either during the Fair, or at any time before the commencement of the Fair, outside of the space assigned them.
13. No person shall be allowed to sell or give away articles upon the Fairgrounds, either during the Fair or at any time before commencement of the Fair, until the license for the privilege has been paid and a receipt issued by the Fair.
14. No pets or other animals are allowed on the Fairgrounds, with the exception of service dogs assisting a physically impaired person and 4-H entries in the 4-H Dog Bldg.
15. There will be no moving of cars or trucks upon the Fairgrounds between the hours of 10:00 a.m. and 11:00 p.m. and then only when Fair Security allows such vehicles safely on the grounds.

This rule will be strictly enforced.

ANIMAL HEALTH REQUIREMENTS

1. Individual health certificates are not required for entry of Washington animals.
2. Out of state animals entries must comply with State of Washington import regulations. BLANKET PERMIT FOR OUT-OF-STATE EXHIBITORS FOR 2011 is 91-WA5712
3. Fair Veterinarians will inspect all classes of livestock and poultry (including horses, pet animals, fur bearing animals, pigeons, ducks, geese and turkeys); before they are exhibited to determine that the livestock and poultry show no clinical indications of contagious, infectious disease or ectoparasites. All poultry must be U.S. pullorum-typhoid clean or equivalent or tested negative for pullorum-typhoid within ninety (90) days of the exhibit.
4. Fair Veterinarians **MUST AND WILL** reject any animals with infectious or contagious disease or ectoparasites. EXHIBITORS should be aware that RINGWORM, WARTS, PINKEYE, STRANGLES, CONTAGIOUS ECTHYMA, SCABIES, LICE, MITES, TICKS AND FLEAS fall into these

categories. Those animals exhibiting disease symptoms during the course of the Fair shall also be rejected.

5. No animal from any quarantined area or premises will be permitted to enter the Fair.
6. Brucellosis – All female cattle over 5 months must be vaccinated for Brucellosis or tested negative to Brucellosis in the last 30 days.
7. All out of state horses must have a negative coggins test within six (6) months, except horses from Oregon.
8. It is strongly recommended, but not required, that cattle be vaccinated in the current show year against the respiratory diseases.
9. The Fair veterinarian's professional decision as to the health status of an animal is final and shall be upheld by the Fair management and board.
NOTE: Veterinary service will be furnished for inspection prior to entering livestock exhibits. EXHIBITORS WILL BE RESPONSIBLE FOR ANY AND ALL VETERINARY SERVICES THEREAFTER.

GENERAL LIVESTOCK REQUIREMENTS

1. All livestock must be groomed and in show condition during open hours of the Fair. Livestock exhibitors will at all times give the necessary and person attention to the exhibits. Failure to comply with this rule may be cause for forfeiture of premiums and ribbons.
2. Decoration materials used shall be limited to aluminum foil, flowers and suitable signs. Flammable materials are not allowed. Final discretion will rest in the authority of the Longview Fire Marshall and the City of Longview Municipal Code.
3. Registered animals (except horses, dogs, cats and poultry) in 4-H and FFA Divisions are eligible to exhibit animal(s) in Open class. All such entries are subject to both Club and Open class rules and

regulations, including entry fees. Entry fees and forms are due on July 1.

4. All livestock must meet the 2011 Exhibition Livestock minimum requirements (on file at the Fair office).
5. If 4-H or FFA entries are turned away due to lack of space, they may enter in Open class if space is available, but cannot cross-enter in 4-H or FFA.
6. Open class exhibitors may not cross-enter in 4-H or FFA.
7. Unruly/unmanageable animals will be sent home upon the concurrence of the department superintendent and the Fair management.
8. All livestock must be watered in their stalls at the superintendents' discretion
9. All cattle (including dairy) will be double-tied.

HOW TO ENTER

This information has been prepared to assist you in locating open class categories in which you might make entries in the Cowlitz County Fair.

Livestock is entered into the Fair according to the entry schedule. All animal divisions require that a pre-entry be submitted by July 1. Livestock is to be delivered to the Fair on Wednesday of Fair Week.

ALL OTHER EXHIBITS are to be brought to the Fair according to the entry schedule. You simply bring the items, work with the department superintendent in filling out an entry form, and leave the item for judging and display. Be sure to pick-up a receipt for claiming the item after the Fair is over. Entry blanks may be obtained from the superintendents of the various departments or the Cowlitz County Fair Office @ 1900 7th Ave., Longview (577-3121). DEPARTMENT RULES

1. ELIGIBILITY

Competition in the open CLASS division is open to all adults, and senior citizens. Competition within some CLASSES is limited to space availability. You must have building superintendent's prior consent before large items may enter in this building.

2. PROFESSIONALS

A. Professional is defined as a person who owns or operates a shop who is entering items they do or, teach in said shop or business.

B. A person who holds a tax stamp, business or state license related to their exhibit.

C. Anyone who teaches a craft on a regular and structured CLASS schedule for pay for the type of items they enter.

D. Must declare professional status in that division at time of entry. Bazaars, raffles, donations or garage sales don't qualify as a professional.

E. No points will be given.

F. No advertising allowed.

G. All of the Rules for a professional can be applied to a person the building superintendent feels can be considered a professional.

3. HANDICAPPED PERSONS

Special consideration will be given in judging ONLY if the handicap directly affects the creation of the item or items entered.

4. Articles become ineligible after two years of its completion.

5. ENTRY AND RELEASE

A. No pre-registration or entry fees are required

B. All entries entered must remain on display for the duration of the Fair.

C. No exhibits released before close of Fair. **NO EXCEPTIONS!**

6. Entries in this department must be home produced and entered in the name of the designer or maker. No entry can compete for awards that have been exhibited at Cowlitz County Fair previously.

7. Entry stub is required to retrieve entries. Entries will be released to owner or owner's representative upon presentation of entry stub at pick-up time.

8. The superintendents of this department shall have complete charge of exhibits, their placement and removal. Please bring large displays early.

9. Group homes, special clubs and societies are invited to exhibit as a group, call superintendent for space approval.

10. Superintendents have the option to reject entries for exhibit which are soiled, chipped, show wear and tear or incomplete and unready for exhibiting or of objectionable subject matter.

11. Members of 4-H Clubs may not enter duplicated items for open CLASS.

12. NOT RESPONSIBLE FOR ITEMS NOT PICKED UP ON MONDAY AT RELEASE TIME. Items not picked up by exhibitor, or exhibitor's representative at designated pick up times, become Property of Cowlitz County Fair.

13. Persons 19 years of age and above may enter in this building. 18 years and under, please refer to Creative Youth.

14. All educational exhibits must be entered by the individual who made it. The superintendent has the right to question the individual about the display.

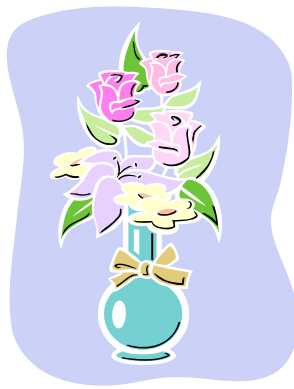

3. Awards in each class will consist of first, second and third place ribbons in addition to the points listed, honorable mention may be awarded. Judging will not be done on exhibits containing artificial flowers or foliage.
4. The Best of Show Awards will not be given unless exhibits scores 95 or more. **BEST OF SHOW EXHIBITS MUST BE KEPT FRESH. EXHIBITS WILL BE REMOVED IF NOT KEPT FRESH.**
5. No exhibitor shall make more than one entry per colors lot with the exception of CLASS 7 (roses) and CLASS 10 (African violets).
6. Each CLASS must be entered on a separate entry sheet.
7. Judging will take place as soon as possible after entries are recorded. The Handbook for Flower Shows by the National Council of State Garden Clubs, Inc. is used for judging. The Danish system of judging will apply to Division C ONLY.
8. Space must be reserved with the Superintendent for entries in the florist, nurseryman, and garden club classes. Space is limited and the first to make reservations will have preference. Exhibits may be cared for before 9:30 a.m.

9. Anyone 17 years of age or under must enter in Division C, classes 1 & 2. Judging will be done by the DanishSystem.

10. The Fair management will not be responsible for the loss of containers, accessories or equipment used in displays.

11. Sections and classes may be added if justified,

12. Cut fruit and prepared food will not be allowed.

13. Premium money will be held if found taking other flowers besides your own.

14. Wedging will be permissible.

15. Stamens in lilies -do not remove

FLOWER HINTS

Cut your flowers in the late afternoon of the day before they are to be exhibited, place the flowers immediately in water that has been set out in the garden all day. Cutting should be done about 4:00 p.m. since at that time there is the greatest amount of sugar in the leaves unless it is extremely hot weather. In this instance cutting in the early morning is optimum. Keep flowers in water in a cool, dark place overnight.

To arrange, cut stems cleanly at an angle under water with a sharp knife and place in water-filled vase or container. Cut stems as long as possible. All foliage that is below the water line should be removed. Foliage should be clean. Remove any broken or disfigured foliage or petals as foliage and stems count in judging as well as blooms. It is better to have more stem and foliage than too little. Groom plants well. Flowers must have their own attached foliage. All stems should be in proportion to the flower.

3. All photos must be taken by the exhibitor but can be professionally processed and mounted.
4. The Superintendent of the Department may refuse entry of photographs deemed to be unsuitable for a general audience.
5. No distinction is made between film, digital, or other technologies in Lot criteria or judging.
6. Titling of prints and digital submissions should be made by exhibitor prior to submission of entries.
7. It is the exhibitors' responsibility to place his/her submission in the appropriate Lot. Submissions inappropriately placed may do less well in competition.
8. Photography – whether print or digital – previously entered in the Cowlitz County Fair competition is ineligible for competition.
9. After a print or digital submission has been entered and judged, it cannot be substituted.
10. This competition is open only to amateur photographers. For the purpose of this competition, a professional photographer is one who earns more than fifty percent of his/her income from photography.
11. Space is provided to Photography Department judges to exhibit up to 3 examples of their work on a non-competitive basis.
12. No entry fees are required to enter the exhibit.

13. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to pick up their exhibits on the dates and times listed above. Uncollected exhibits may be discarded.

14. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to read and understand these rules.

Each submission is awarded a Blue, Red, White, or Honorable Mention ribbon. Premiums are: Blue – 10 pts; Red – 5 pts; White – 3 pts. SPECIAL AWARDS Divisions A, B & C

People's Choice Award for each Division is selected by ballot by visitors to the exhibit. Superintendent's Award and Fair Theme Award are selected by the superintendent. Fair Theme Award is based on the best photo depicting the Fair theme. These awards do not receive premiums.
